The editor and the Board will keep this list under review and amend it as required.

- 3. To be eligible for selection, an article should have been published not more than two years earlier.
- 4. The editor will select articles relevant to Victorian law which are likely to be useful to judicial officers in decision-making and to practitioners in giving advice and preparing submissions.
- 5. Preference will be shown for articles which
 - a. elucidate legal doctrine, whether common law or statutory;
 - b. are written in a form and style which is accessible to a non-academic audience.
- 6. Articles may also be selected which have a theoretical or empirical focus, even if not of immediate doctrinal application.
- 7. Selection of articles will seek to ensure coverage of a wide range of legal topics, and diversity of authorship and perspectives.
